


1 Use a tripod

A tripod will hold your camera steady while taking pictures of small objects. For extra stability use the Nikon SnapBridge app to remote control the shutter.



2 Set Aperture Priority

Aperture Priority mode is excellent for macro as you control the depth of field and let the camera do the rest.



3 Find a plain background

Make the subject your star by having a plain background. Inside, you can use a plain wall or make a backdrop with paper.

4 Light your subject

6 Use Manual focus

Macro photography is a great way to learn how to accurately focus manually. Slight changes can alter the focal point on an object for different effects.
